alienate ALE•yuh•nate VERB to make uninterested or unfriendly; to take away interest or affection [Her terrible behavior is sure to alienate her whole family.]

banish BAN ish VERB

- 1. to send or drive away; to get rid of [The woman's reassuring words helped to *banish* the child's fears.]
- 2. to force to leave a place by order of some high authority [The new law will *banish* all foreigners from the country.]

dissension di SEN shun NOUN disagreement; quarreling; hard feelings caused by a difference of opinion [There was some dissension about which team uniforms to get.]

edible ED•uh•bul ADJECTIVE fit to eat; safe to eat [Are those edible mushrooms or poisonous ones?]

implore *im•PLORE* VERB to beg earnestly; to ask urgently [We *implore* you to give us more time.]

lackadaisical lak•uh•DAY•zi•kul ADJECTIVE showing a lack of interest or spirit; lifeless and uninterested [Lori was told to scrub the table, but she just gave it a lackadaisical swipe with the dishcloth.]

optional OP•shuh•nul ADJECTIVE
left to one's choice; not required or automatic
[Your name is required, but giving your address is optional.]

painstaking PAINZ•take•ing ADJECTIVE requiring or using great effort or care [Making a fine violin is painstaking work.]

plumage PLOOM•ij NOUN

all of a bird's feathers (plumes) together [The swans settled down to groom their *plumage*.]

reprimand REP•ruh•mand

NOUN a sharp scolding or criticism, especially by a person in authority [A reprimand from the boss got the staff back to work immediately.] VERB to scold or criticize sharply [I expected my mother to reprimand me for being rude.]

scanty SKAN•tee ADJECTIVE small in quantity or amount; not enough or barely enough; in short supply [Only half a sandwich makes a scanty meal.]

sinister SIN • us • tur ADJECTIVE

- 1. suggesting harm, evil, or misfortune; threatening [One look at the *sinister* clouds made us realize a big storm was coming.]
- 2. evil; wicked [A chill went up the victim's spine as he saw the robber's *sinister* smile.]

transaction trans•AK•shun NOUN
the act of carrying on business; an individual
piece of business, such as a deal or agreement
[The company president handles the important
transactions herself.]

in no way harmed or injured; unhurt [The tornado destroyed some parts of the city but left other areas unscathed.]

honest and respectable in character and behavior; honorable [The mayor praised the children as *upstanding* citizens for their help in the city's tree-planting program.]

A dog with a bandaged foot limped into Deadwood one day. The sheriff eyed him suspiciously. "Listen, stranger, I don' mean ta alienate ya, an' I'd sure hate ta have ta banish ya. So let's not have no dissension. But I gotta tell ya, mister, ya look kinda


