ambivalent am • BIV • uh • lunt ADJECTIVE having conflicting feelings; uncertain due to mixed feelings [Rob was ambivalent about the prom; he wanted to go but hated spending the money to rent a tuxedo.]

backlog BACK•log NOUN a collection or accumulation of tasks not done or orders not filled [Jasmine had a backlog of filing to do and worked late to finish it.]

cascade kass•KADE

NOUN something falling or rushing forth in great quantity, as water over steep rocks

[Paolo opened his locker, and a cascade of books and papers poured out.]

VERB to fall as in a cascade [Catherine let her

cowardice KOW•ur•diss NOUN lack of courage [Kurt showed his cowardice by lying about the accident instead of taking responsibility for it.]

hair *cascade* over her shoulders.]

eerie EAR • ee ADJECTIVE
unusual or unnatural in a way that causes a
vague uneasiness or fear [The strange howling
that came from the house was eerie.]

hodgepodge *HOJ•poj* NOUN a jumbled mixture of things [Our furniture doesn't really go together; it's a *hodgepodge* of items we've acquired over the years.]

impel *im•PEL* VERB to cause by some kind of force, either physical or not physical [Did fear *impel* you to run from the scene?]

jubilation joo•buh•LAY•shun NOUN great joy, usually with feelings of triumph [We expressed our jubilation with loud cheers.]

parody PAIR • uh • dee NOUN

an exaggerated imitation of something for the purpose of making fun of it [One scene was a parody of game shows in which every contestant was both annoying and unbelievably dumb.]

queasy KWEE•zee ADJECTIVE feeling physical or emotional uneasiness; somewhat sick to one's stomach [Just the thought of riding one of those giant roller coasters makes me *queasy*.]

refrain *ri•FRAIN*NOUN a phrase or verse that is repeated at the end of each section of a poem or song [The singer asked us to join in on the *refrain*.]

VERB to hold back from doing something [Please *refrain* from shouting in the library.]

saga SAH•guh NOUN

a long, detailed story, usually about legendary figures or historical events [The book was a saga of the South that told the story of many generations of one family.]

a condition in which the mind and senses are so dulled that one can barely think, act, or feel; a state of being nearly unconscious [Bonita was exhausted; she flopped down on the couch and fell into a *stupor*.]

transient TRAN•shunt ADJECTIVE

passing with time; temporary [I had a sudden but transient feeling of anger that faded when I thought about the situation.]

cruel and unjust government by a person or group having complete power; very cruel and unjust use of power or authority [Mr. Lucas's word is law in his household, and his entire family suffers under his *tyranny*.]
