## aghast uh · GAST ADJECTIVE

struck with amazed dismay; shocked and astonished [Amelia was *aghast* at the sight of the wreck.]

#### curt KURT ADJECTIVE

so short or brief as to seem rude [Shu Nan's reply to my invitation was a *curt* "No."]

### disarray diseuheRAY NOUN

- **1.** an untidy condition; disorder or confusion [After Mom and Dad's anniversary party, our house was in complete *disarray*.]
- **2.** disorderly dress [I threw on some clothes and arrived on time but in a state of *disarray*.]

#### extrovert EX-truh-vurt NOUN

a sociable person who likes to be with other people and makes friends easily [One reason that Mr. Herrera is such a good salesman is that he's an *extrovert*.]

#### finagle fi • NAY • gul VERB

to get or arrange by cleverness or trickery; to use sneaky methods [Eli used a slight sniffle to *finagle* his way out of doing his work.]

#### immoral ih • MOR • ul ADJECTIVE

not moral; wrong according to the standards of right and wrong; sinful [Andy felt guilty about cheating, knowing that it was *immoral*.]

#### improvise IM-pruh-vize VERB

- 1. to perform without preparation [Sergio can *improvise* a clever song on any subject.]
- 2. to make from whatever is available [Let's try to *improvise* a raft from the driftwood we find on the beach.]

#### outlandish out • LAN • dish ADJECTIVE

very odd; extremely strange [Ivan has the *outlandish* idea that the squirrels in the back yard are trying to communicate with him.]

#### overcast OH•vur•kast ADJECTIVE

cloudy (said of the sky or the weather) [An *overcast* day is predicted for tomorrow.]

#### pittance PIT-unce NOUN

a very small allowance, wage, or payment [The workers claimed they were receiving only a *pittance* for their long hours of labor.]

#### quell KWEL VERB

- **1.** to bring to a stop; to put an end to (something) by force or persuasion; to overcome [The police tried to *quell* the riot quickly and without injuries to anyone.]
- 2. to make calm; to quiet [The mother talked gently to her son to *quell* his fear.]

#### recur ri•KUR VERB

to happen or occur again [If those strange noises from last night *recur* tonight, I'm going to try to find out what's causing them.]

#### shirk SHIRK VERB

to avoid or leave undone (something that should be done) [You can always count on Yazmina; she won't *shirk* her obligations.]

## unswerving un • SWUR • ving ADJECTIVE

- **1.** not turning aside or changing course [The bull made an *unswerving* charge across the pasture, straight for the red pickup.]
- 2. steady; firm; not changing [Even when times were hard, my parents' devotion to each other was *unswerving*.]



There once was a fellow named Irving, Whose energy Irv was conserving.

He was able to shirk

Nearly all of his work;

Irv's devotion to sleep was unswerving!

## vogue VOHG NOUN

- 1. the fashion or style at a particular time [Both short hair and short skirts were the *vogue* for women in the 1920s.]
- **2.** popularity or general acceptance, usually of a temporary nature [I wonder what colors will be in *vogue* this year.]
