/ astute uh • STOOT ADJECTIVE

clever and sharp-minded; showing a thorough and deep understanding [Uncle Kenny is an astute lawyer; there isn't much about legal matters that he doesn't know.]

bias BY•us

NOUN a strong leaning for or against something that is based on personal preference or a set idea [The store owner seemed to have a *bias* against teenagers and refused to hire me.]

VERB to cause to look favorably or unfavorably on; to create a bias [Shelly looked as sweet as she could in an effort to *bias* the jury.]

compile kum • PILE VERB

- 1. to gather together and put in order [After Mrs. Lee *compiles* the receipts, we'll know exactly how much we've spent.]
- 2. to create something by collecting materials from a variety of sources [The chef will *compile* the best recipes into one cookbook.]

destitute DESS • ti • toot ADJECTIVE extremely poor; without basic necessities [The destitute people in the refugee camp had little food and almost no medicine.]

enhance en • HANCE VERB

to make greater or heighten; to add to in a way that improves [Putting in a swimming pool would *enhance* the value of the property.]

extraneous ex•TRAY•nee•us ADJECTIVE not needed or not related to what is being considered or dealt with [Since only soup was served, the forks on the table were extraneous.]

fabricate FAB•ri•kate VERB

- 1. to make or manufacture [This factory fabricates various kinds of machine parts.]
- 2. to make up; to create something untrue [The girl hoped she could *fabricate* a story that would keep her from being punished.]

Iflaunt FLAWNT VERB

to show off [The man took every opportunity to flaunt his build by flexing his muscles.]

heyday HEY•day NOUN

the time of greatest success or strength [In their *heyday*, that band was at the top of the charts week after week.]

illegible ih • LEJ • uh • bul ADJECTIVE impossible to read due to sloppy or faint writing or printing [The sign was so weather-beaten that it had become illegible.]

intuition in • too • ISH • un NOUN

an understanding or knowledge of something without the use of reasoning [Peter's intuition told him that Gwen was a person he could trust completely.]

lush LUSH ADJECTIVE

- 1. growing thickly or heavily [The rain forest is full of *lush* vegetation and amazing creatures.]
- 2. luxurious [Having grown up in much more *lush* surroundings, the princess had difficulty in adjusting to a cottage in the woods.]

VERB to calm with medication [It is often helpful to *sedate* a patient before setting a broken bone.]

a period of watch, usually during a time when one would normally be asleep; the act of staying awake to watch over [The sick child's parents took turns keeping a *vigil* over her.]
