blameworthy BLAME•wur•thee ADJECTIVE deserving to be blamed [The judge ruled that both drivers were equally blameworthy and threw out their lawsuits against each other.]

catastrophe kuh • TASS • truh • fee NOUN a sudden and severe misfortune; a disaster [Failure to put the campfire out completely resulted in a catastrophe.]

chide CHIDE VERB

to express disapproval; to scold [Winona's parents *chide* her if she uses bad manners.]

defect DEE•fekt NOUN

a lack of something necessary for completeness or perfection; a fault; an imperfection [This

coat was on sale because it has a tiny *defect* in the lining.]

√ falsehood FALSE•hood NOUN

a false statement; a lie [Tim's story of how he spent the afternoon was filled with falsehoods.]

filch FILCH VERB

to steal, especially something small or of little value [Each girl accused the other of trying to filch her pencil.]

lethal LEE • thul ADJECTIVE

causing death [Many medicines are *lethal* if too large a dose is taken.]

/perimeter pur•IH•muh•tur NOUN

the outer boundary of an area or the total length of this boundary [Dad measured the yard's *perimeter* to see how much fencing he would need to buy.]

recurrent ri•KUR•unt ADJECTIVE

appearing or happening again or from time to time [The beauty of nature is a recurrent theme in the poems of Robert Frost.]

tedious TEE•dee•us ADJECTIVE
long and tiring; boring [Copying the entire paper by hand was tedious work.]

thwart THWORT VERB

to keep someone from doing something or keep a thing from being done [The bank's refusal to lend us money will *thwart* our plans to buy a house.]

totter TOT•ur VERB

to move in an unsteady way due to a problem with balance; to stand or walk in a shaky way [The baby managed to *totter* four steps.]

update UP date

VERB to bring up to date with additions or corrections; to make known the most recent facts, ideas, and so on [Ling will *update* us on plans for the class party.]

NOUN a current version or updated report [Mom kept switching stations, hoping for an *update* on the weather.]

vehement VEE • uh • munt ADJECTIVE

having or showing very strong feeling; intensely emotional [The plan to chop down the forest to build new airport runways was met with *vehement* objections.]

✓vertical VUR•ti•kul ADJECTIVE

in a straight up-and-down position; upright [The sides of a house are usually *vertical*.]
