antidote AN•ti•dote NOUN

1. a substance or treatment given to oppose the effects of poison [Raw eggs are used as an *antidote* for certain kinds of poisons.]
2. something that works to correct or cure a bad or evil condition [The concert was the perfect *antidote* for my bad mood.]

bedlam BED•lum NOUN

great confusion and disorder
[After someone yelled "Fire!" in the store, there was total *bedlam*.]

designate DEZ•ig•nate VERB

1. to show by a mark, sign, or symbol [Blue lines on a map usually *designate* rivers.]
2. to call by a certain name, term, or title [Egg producers often use "jumbo" to *designate* the very largest eggs.]
3. to select or appoint for a certain purpose or duty; to appoint [The class is supposed to *designate* two students to represent us.]

ethical ETH•uh•kul ADJECTIVE

relating to what is right or wrong in behavior; agreeing with the rules of society or of a particular group; moral [Is it *ethical* for a judge to conduct the trial of a friend?]

extensive ek•STEN•siv ADJECTIVE

large in area, amount, effect, influence, and so on [Research into a cure for the common cold has been both *extensive* and expensive.]

indispensable in•di•SPEN•suh•bul ADJECTIVE
absolutely necessary; essential [Food and water are *indispensable* to animals and plants.]

medieval med•EE•vul ADJECTIVE

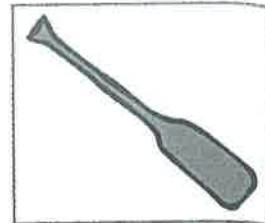
like or having to do with the Middle Ages, the time from about A.D. 500 to 1500 [The *medieval* period began with the collapse of the Roman Empire.]

oust OWST VERB

to force to leave; to drive out [We voted to *oust* our mayor for failing to cut taxes.]

preposterous pri•POSS•tur•us ADJECTIVE

so against truth, reason, or common sense as to be ridiculous [Whose *preposterous* idea was it to get pink uniforms for the football team?]

seep SEEP VERB

to leak, drip, or flow out slowly; to ooze
[After most of the milk had managed to *seep* out, we found a tiny hole in the carton.]

spunk SPUNK NOUN

courage, enthusiasm, and determination [With her *spunk*, Eva will finish the race in spite of her sprained ankle.]

succumb suh•KUM VERB

1. to give in under pressure or force; to yield; often used with to ["Do not *succumb* to temptation," the little boy's mother said. "I know exactly how many cookies there are."]
2. to die [Sadly, many more people will *succumb* before the new drugs can reach them.]

vanity VAN•uh•tee NOUN

extreme concern with, or pride in, one's appearance, abilities, possessions, and so on [My *vanity* wouldn't let me wear pants like those even if they came in my size.]

vigilant VIJ•uh•lunt ADJECTIVE

staying watchful for danger or trouble; alert [Shouts from a *vigilant* soldier prepared the other troops for attack.]

witticism WIT•uh•siz•um NOUN

a clever and amusing remark [The class howled at Spencer's *witticism*, and even the teacher cracked a smile.]
